President & CEO Message

As we enter 2025, we reflect on Utah Food Bank's remarkable 120-year journey. What began as the Salt Lake Charity Association in 1904 has evolved into a statewide mission of *Fighting Hunger Statewide*, serving all 29 counties in Utah. Over the years, we've provided more than **one billion meals** — a powerful testament to the enduring strength of community support.

Last year brought significant challenges to many Utahns, including a persistent struggle for financial stability. Unfortunately, families are still facing impossible choices: prioritizing rent over groceries, delaying essential medical care, or cutting other necessities just to make ends meet. For many, a single unexpected expense can trigger a crisis. Individuals, families, and seniors who never expected to face food insecurity are turning to us for help, highlighting the precarious reality so many Utahns face.

Hunger does not have a single face or reside in one place—it exists across all 29 Utah counties. Every day, we encounter the many faces of hunger, each with a unique story of resilience, gratitude, and hope. From the quiet streets of Hurricane Valley to the bustling avenues of Salt Lake City, these stories inspire and drive our mission forward.

To better serve the rising demand, we are proud to announce that all Utah Food Bank locations are now operational following our extensive, multi-pronged expansion project! Over the past three years, we have expanded, built, or purchased a total of seven facilities to more efficiently and effectively fight hunger across the state.

- **Salt Lake City:** Our 26,000-square-foot west wing expansion has increased our warehouse space and enables us to host large-scale volunteer projects.
- **St. George:** Our Southern Distribution Center has doubled in size to better serve the southern Utah region.
- **Springville:** The 77,000-square-foot Timpanogos Distribution Center is fully operational to serve the needs of central Utah and Utah County.
- **Blanding:** Our Southeastern Distribution Center, an 18,000-square-foot facility with attached pantry, is open and serving San Juan County and the Navajo Nation.

Additionally, we are thrilled to introduce three new Utah Food Bank-owned and operated food pantries located in Montezuma Creek, Monument Valley, and Hurricane.

Every contribution—whether food, time, or money—nourishes both bodies and hearts. Together, we are building a brighter, healthier future for all Utahns. Thank you for being an essential part of journey of service and for helping us continue *Fighting Hunger Statewide*.



Faces of Hunger:


The Blackhorses




